Description

Pareidolia is when we see patterns of faces where none exist. This could include your taps at home the outside of your house from windows being eyes and a door representing a mouth. We can see face almost everywhere from the arounds of food in a bowl to objects on the ground. This activity can be done in your home or when out for a walk

Resources Needed:

Camera – can include a phone, disposable camera, tablet, (adult assisted)

Intent

To find representations of faces around the home.

Implementation

Use a camera to take photos of objects that look like faces – this can include taps in the bathroom, door handles, on a car or even handles on a mug.

Take photos of these and upload them to tapestry
